

Keith Beurskens



Mr. Keith Beurskens is the Division Chief, General Learning Outcomes Curriculum Division, within the Center for Teaching and Learning Excellence, Army University. From April, 2014 - July, 2015, Mr. Beurskens was the lead author for the Army University White Paper and the Strategic Business Plan for the Army University which led to Department of the Army approval to establish the Army University in June, 2015.

Prior to this special assignment from July, 2010 through March 2014, Mr. Beurskens established and served as the Deputy of the School of Advanced Leadership and Tactics (SALT), within the Command and General Staff College. Mr. Beurskens took an innovative approach to designing SALT, focusing the organization of providing quality products and exceptional

service to the Training and Doctrine Command (TRAOD) Centers of Excellence and Branch Schools. SALT's mission is to provide continuing education towards developing the new officers and warrant officers through the selection for Major and Chief Warrant Officer 3.

Prior to establishing SLAT, Mr. Beurskens served as served five years as chief of the Institutional Leader Development Division, Center for Army Leadership responsible for the horizontal and vertical integration and synchronization across all Professional Military Education (PME) Systems, and the curriculum development of Army Leadership curriculum. Mr. Beurskens has served on numerous TRADOC and Army level task forces and working groups as the subject matter expert for PME.

Mr. Beurskens is a doctoral student at the University of Phoenix pursuing a doctorate of management with an emphasis in organizational leadership. He will submit his dissertation this Fall. Mr. Beurskens also holds a Master's of Science in Civil Engineering from the University of Colorado and a Bachelor's of Science in Personnel and Industrial Relations from Utah State University. Mr. Beurskens attended the Harvard Senior Executive Fellows program in 2012.

Prior to becoming a Department of the Army civilian, Mr. Beurskens completed a twenty-four-year military career that included assignments in combat engineer units, the Corps of Engineers, ROTC as Professor of Military Science at the University of Illinois, and MACOM level staffs.
